

**FRANCHISE DISCLOSURE DOCUMENT**

The franchisee will operate a business (an "Einstein Bros. Restaurant") that specializes in the sale of fresh-baked bagels, cream cheese and other spreads, specialty coffees and teas, baked sweets and snacks, and creative soups, salads and sandwiches, among other things.

The estimated total initial investment necessary to begin operation of an Einstein Bros. Restaurant franchise ranges from \$618,300 to \$915,850. This includes \$41,000 to \$47,000 that you must pay to us before you open.

If you enter into an area development agreement, the development fee will be \$10,000 for each Einstein Bros. Restaurant to be opened under that agreement.

This disclosure document summarizes certain provisions of your franchise agreement and other information in plain English. Read this disclosure document and all accompanying agreements carefully. You must receive this disclosure document at least 14 calendar-days before you sign a binding agreement with, or make any payment to, the franchisor or an affiliate in connection with the proposed franchise sale. **Note, however, that no governmental agency has verified the information contained in this document.**

You may wish to receive your disclosure document in another format that is more convenient for you. The terms of your contract will govern your franchise relationship. Don't rely on the disclosure document alone to understand your contract. Read all of your contract carefully. Show your contract and this disclosure document to an advisor, like a lawyer or an accountant.

Buying a franchise is a complex investment. The information in this disclosure document can help you make up your mind. 1. THE FRANCHISE AGREEMENT PERMITS THE FRANCHISEE TO MEDIATE OR LITIGATE ONLY IN COLORADO. OUT OF STATE MEDIATION OR LITIGATION MAY FORCE YOU TO ACCEPT A LESS FAVORABLE SETTLEMENT FOR DISPUTES. IT MAY ALSO COST MORE TO MEDIATE OR LITIGATE WITH THE FRANCHISOR IN COLORADO THAN IN YOUR HOME STATE.
  2. THE FRANCHISE AGREEMENT STATES THAT THE LAW OF COLORADO GOVERNS THE AGREEMENT, AND THIS LAW MAY NOT PROVIDE THE SAME PROTECTIONS AND BENEFITS AS LOCAL LAW. YOU MAY WANT TO COMPARE THESE LAWS.
  3. THERE MAY BE OTHER RISKS CONCERNING THIS FRANCHISE.
