Dear Mr. Sexton:

I am writing in response to your letter of April 11, 2012 requesting that we either arrange for impoundment of franchise fees, post a surety bond or defer receipt of franchise fees, based on your analysis of our audited financial statements for the year ended January 3, 2012.

We believe that your focus on only Noodles & Company's (the "Company") current assets/current liabilities ratio is too narrow based on the financial wherewithal demonstrated in our financial statements and we respectfully request that you agree to waive any such requirement for Noodles & Company.

The Company is a substantial restaurant operating company that generates significant earnings and cash flow and has substantial financial resources. As shown in our financial statements, at January 3, 2012, the Company operated 239 restaurants, recognized over \$250,000,000 in revenue and generated approximately \$28,000,000 in cash from operations and the Company has a net worth in excess of \$7,500,000.

The Company had available at year end approximately \$40 million of undrawn borrowing capacity under its line of credit with a group of commercial banks, maturing in 2016. The Company has at all times been in compliance with its covenants under the credit agreement.

Your letter indicates that you have considered the Company's excess of current liabilities (approximately \$20,800,000 at January 3, 2012) over its current assets (approximately \$12,900,000 at January 3, 2012) in making your request for us to lodge security or defer fees. However, virtually all restaurant operating companies have substantial current liabilities in excess of current assets because of the nature of their business: restaurant meals are sold for cash or credit payable through promptly funded credit card receipts, none of which result in accounts receivable on a company's books, while amounts incurred for salaries and wages, and for the cost of goods, are payable in arrears after the goods or services are provided, resulting in accounts payable and accrued expenses that are inevitably large relative to the current assets.

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
